The Dartmouth Heritage Museum is pleased to announce the launching of its new logo. This logo is another step in improving the museum's profile with a recognizable and professional brand.


The Dartmouth Heritage Museum Society Board were asked by the graphic designer for the strongest themes representing the Museum's vision. These themes followed 4 seperate threads:

# Digital Techniques Solving Historical Mysteries

Sleuthing is, well, just plain fun. Computer sleuthing, doubly so. With the current day tools at our disposal, many methods become available to solve age-old mysteries. These techniques and this equipment are not just available to the specialists anymore. Anyone with a home computer, the internet and some imagination can begin their trek into the fun-filled world of historical mystery solving!

This became apparent recently at the Dartmouth Heritage Museum. I asked a small question about the exact number of Judge Alexander James and Harriet Hawthorn's children who died from diphtheria as this information was somewhat wrapped into why Evergreen House was built in the first place. There seemed to be much confusion around this, as reports varied from 2 to 7. Anita Price, the curator, was able to provide a genealogical report, generated via the internet, of Harriet and her children, which answered these questions (for the answers, come for a tour at Evergreen!).

I discussed this small eureka with one of our volunteers, Pat Gilbert, who mentioned she had seen the gravesite of the James family in downtown Dartmouth. I visited the site and was somewhat crestfallen to see that the surface of the stones was very worn with only half of the words readable. I took many digital pictures with my camera, loaded them into the computer and went to work.

Using digital imaging techniques of brightness and contrast shifting, I was able to enhance some of the more obvious words, but some still eluded me. The bottom two lines were almost completely unreadable except for two words (steadfast & abounding) and a group of letters at the very bottom of the stone that were very clear.... COR.

I eventually concluded that COR = Corinthians and hence the bottom unreadable two lines were a quote from the bible. Visiting the internet and doing an online bible search of the readable two words within Corinthians, there it was, the complete quote:

> Steadfast, unmoveable always Abounding in the work of the Lord







Knowing of my hunt, Anita showed me a photograph from the collection that was labelled on the back to be Harriet Hawthorn's daughter. This handwritten note was puzzling, as the picture was c. 1865 and therefore, too early to be of the daughter's generation. I scanned in the photograph, as well as another known picture of Harriet, sized the heads of each to line up with each other, and superimposed them. Ta Da! Even mother and daughter will have discrepancies in facial structure, but this was a true match. The photo was, in fact, Harriet herself.
