# Colours of History

Evergreen House, a heritage building owned by the Halifax Regional Municipality and operated by the Dartmouth Heritage Museum, is travelling back in time to 1867! The exterior of this historic home has been transformed lovingly using the original 139-year old paint



colours. Research performed last year determined the colours and the community has waited eagerly to see the results. The wait has ended! At the moment the first square yard of colour was brushed on, neighbours were giving a big "thumbs-up".

#### **Early Owners**

Evergreen is situated on a plot that was originally part of a large land grant deeded in 1752. James Creighton Jr. (1762-1828) purchased the property in the 1780's and established an inn and ferry service that began operation in 1786.

Judge Alexander James purchased the property from the Creighton Family in 1862. James had originally come to Dartmouth as a young school teacher. He studied law independently and was later admitted to the bench. It was at the beginning of his career as a Provincial Court Judge that he commenced building Evergreen.

In 1845, near the time he began his career in law, Alexander James married Harriet Hawthorn of Dartmouth. Initially, the couple lived on Queen Street in downtown Dartmouth. They had many children, five of whom died in a diphtheria epidemic within 5 months between 1858 and 1859, perhaps precipi-


tating the plans to move the family to the relative country location of Evergreen. In 1865, while wait-

ing for the house to be built, Alexander and Harriet lost two more children (cause of death unknown).

The ownership of Evergreen passed from the James family in 1900. Two decades of short term ownership then followed, to be ended in 1918 by the return of the property

to the Creighton Family. Charles and Alice Creighton moved into Evergreen with their family in 1921.



#### Helen Creighton

Helen Creighton, daughter of Charles and Alice Creighton, lived in the house 57 years, assuming ownership upon the death of her father in 1943. From 1928 onwards, she worked tirelessly to amass the

largest individually collected body of folklore in Canada. Her collection, which is housed at the Nova Scotia Archives and Records Management in Halifax, includes research files,

photographs and over 1 6 , 0 0 0 folk songs.

She garnered recognition and distinctions from around the world, including a Fellowship in the American Folklore Society and the Order of Canada, and earned the title: Canada's First Lady of Folklore. The City of Dartmouth purchased Evergreen from her in 1978, and established it as a public historic house.
