The Old Church

Other than Rev. James Morrison's report to the Synod of Nova Scotia in 1830 that the old church could accommodate between four and five hundred persons, the only other description that we have of the church on King Street is contained in a memoir written during the early years of the 20th century by the late Mrs. George Roome, a respected senior member of the St. James congregation. Her memoir of a very young girl attending worship service with her father was read by Mr. W. P. Morrison, the son of a former pastor and himself a long term member of the Session, during 100th Anniversary celebrations of the St. James Congregation in 1927:

A very little girl is crossing Ochterloney Street from King Street, dressed in a white dimity dress dotted with blue corn flowers, gathered in the waist with a cord girdle with tassels; she is on her way to church with her Father.

The building, now our fire engine house, was a square-looking building both from without and within. The roof was much the same as it is now, but no belfry. The door at the main entrance was in two sections, above it was a frame work of wood, peaked in the center and we think the glass was set in diamond shape.

We enter under the balcony or gallery where the choir was stationed. The pews were very straight and stiff, each having a little door which we carefully buttoned on entering. We used to think that it was to keep out the church mice. There were two not very wide aisles on either side of the center pews. The side pews were small, except for a few long ones at the end of the aisles extending across the front towards the pulpit.

The front center pew extended from aisle to aisle, and seemed to be reserved for strangers or visitors. But it always had one occupant, a quite elderly man who seemed to know more about the church than anyone else. We were told it was Deacon Taylor, and we can remember him for many years after.

The Old Church (continued)

A broad shelf hung down from the front pew. We don't remember ever seeing it raised, but somehow it could be done and was used during Communion Service.

The Pulpit was so eclipsed by the colored glass and furnishings in the new Church that it seems very hazy, but we think Professor McKnight went up five or six steps to a crescent shaped box and closed the door. Something hung over his head above the pulpit; they called it a sounding board; it was not very beautiful, but a pretty white dove with a sprig of green in its bill was attached to it, and it was always there to greet us. The wings never fluttered, the body never moved, in fact it reminded us of something on a tombstone.

One thing that impressed us as children, was the fact that the good old Professor not only gave out the number of the Psalm, but by striking a piece of metal on the pulpit he started the choir singing. We afterwards learned this was a tuning fork.

The interior of the building was all light and dark oak, grained and varnished as almost all wood was at that time. Our pennies were dropped in a box attached to a long pole, making it easy to reach every one in the pew.

However, with all the stiffness and lack of beauty, it was our Church, and we rarely pass the old building without thinking reverently of the hours spent there in Sunday School and in Church.

The members of the choir were: Jane Farquharson, Isabella Robb, Annie Elliott, Minnie Allen, Mary I. MacNab and Alex. Farquharson.




Lemon Curd

(makes 1 1/3 cups) 3 large lemons 5 eggs 1 cup sugar

8 tbsp. unsalted butter

Grate the lemon and set aside. Squeeze the juice and put into a blender or food processor. Add the remaining ingredients and process until smooth. Pour the mixture into a very heavy sauce pan or the top half of a double boiler. Stir in the lemon rind and cook over low heat or over simmering water for about 10 minutes, until thickened. Stir the mixture with a wire whisk if it appears lumpy. Chill the lemon curd before serving; it becomes thicker as it cools. Use as a spread on crumpets, muffins, and toast.

Painting Theft!

Police Requesting Public Assistance

Halifax Regional Police is requesting the public's assistance in connection with a theft of art work that occurred at the Museum.

On Wednesday, March 23, police were called to Evergreen House on Newcastle Street in regards to a theft of two paintings. Today, investigators are releasing pictures of the paintings in hopes that they will be located or returned safely.

The first painting is an unsigned work that depicts ships between the islands on the western side of Mahone Bay, N.S. The date of this work is unknown but it is thought to have been painted in the late 1800s and is approximately 9" long and 5.5" wide. The second is by J.E. Elliott and depicts ships in Halifax Harbour, perhaps from a Point Pleasant Park vantage point, with a woman in a white dress on the shore. It was painted in 1887 and is approximately 18" long and 11.5" wide.

Military History

After more than 20 years of proudly displaying Dartmouth and Canadian military history, the Military Museum, run by the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) Branch Somme No. 31, has closed its doors. Located on King Street in Dartmouth, the museum began after members gathered together a collection of their memorabilia and moved it into the three-storey house next door to the legion building. This collection included uniforms, ammunition, weaponry, medical supplies, photographs and books, just to name a few. Unfortunately, according to member Earl Bryan (aka Doc), the legion could no longer afford to maintain the museum and the building was sold. Fortunately, this important collection will be maintained within the community. Artifacts have been turned over several local museums, including the Shearwater Aviation Museum, the Halifax Citadel Museum and the Dartmouth Heritage Museum (DHM).

The DHM has accepted a few hundred pieces, ranging from uniforms and kit rolls to a drum and an artificial leg. This will greatly enhance the museum's collection, as previously it had only a limited number of military-related pieces. Not only will it help to preserve an important piece of world and Canadian history, but it will also tell the important local history of the RCL Somme Branch No. 31, the brave citizens it represents and the Military Museum they once founded.


