## Tales of Mott's Chocolate



In the early nineteenth century, a world of chocolate and spices opened up along the shoreline of Dartmouth. With a community where businesses of sugar and molasses had thrived, it was only a matter of time before chocolate would be thrown into the mix.

John Prescott Mott established his chocolate and soap works from his estate at Hazelhurst in 1844. He would manufacture cocoa, candles, pepper and other spice condiments. His products sold all over Canada, primarily in the Atlantic Provinces and Newfoundland. Often the advertisements would proclaim how the chocolate would make an excellent, healthy breakfast choice. A chocolate maker from Switzerland, a man named John Trueb was hired to work at Mott's and moved to Dartmouth around 1890.

## Sugar, Spice, and Blackmail

The chocolate business proved to be a lucrative one for John P. Mott, as he became one of the wealthiest men in Dartmouth. With that wealth came a bit of trouble. As described in Harry Chapman's




Advertisement for Mott's various chocolate products

White Shirts and Blue Collars: Industry in Dartmouth: "An unsigned pencilled letter, postmarked in Halifax, and dated January 21, 1888, demanded \$600 in gold [\$16,760.00 today]; if he [John P. Mott] ignored the demand or went to the police, he would be shot." The money was to be placed behind the door of the smoking room on the 8 o'clock ferry the following Monday evening. Mott followed the instructions with two exceptions: he did notify the police, and the gold coins were replaced with copper ones.

What happened next was something one would hope to see in a movie. Mott boarded the ferry to Halifax at the appointed time, followed shortly by a well-dressed young man. On the ferry, there was a man slumped near the back, seemingly drunk. Mott placed the money in the designated location, and left the ferry on the Halifax side. The young man left, only to board again for the return trip to Dartmouth. Again he made to look as if to leave, but then quickly went to the hiding place of the money to retrieve it. That was when the drunk – actually a police officer – sprang up and grabbed him. The young man ended up being a sailor, and since the letter could not be connected to him, he was acquitted of all charges.

The would-be blackmailer certainly chose wisely for who to target. After his death, it was calculated that John Mott's estate was valued at \$757,785; which in today's money is a little over \$21 million. While his estate would go to his wife, and the chocolate factory to his business associate at the time; Mott also bequeathed money to Dalhousie University, and various institutes that helped the poor, the blind, and the deaf.

## More than Sweets

Mott's property and business dabbled in what some may call house-flipping, 19th century style. The soap-making department of his factory was a later installment, housed in an old barracks - shown above - for French prisoners during the Napoleonic Wars. It was used as a prison until 1804.

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## Runs in the Family

It is known that John P. Mott travelled to the United States as a young man to study and train in the business of chocolate. He likely went to work with his uncle William Baker in Dorset, Massachusetts. William Baker was the husband of Deborah Mott, the older sister of Henry Yeoman Mott, John's father. It was through this family connection that introduced John to the world of chocolate. It was his father who originally bought the estate that would make up the chocolate manufactory. John Mott would join his father, eventually owning the business outright and introducing the spice and soap manufacturing to the already lucrative business.

#### Other Chocolatiers

Earlier in this article I mentioned John Trueb from Switzerland. While he immigrated to Dartmouth initially to work with Mott's, he would eventually establish his own business in Halifax. Trueb's Confectionary was opened circa. 1906 at 193 Barrington Street., which is near by Pier 21. The store was closed in 1917, likely damaged by the Halifax Harbour Explosion that December. The Trueb family had lived on Pleasant Street in Dartmouth, and in 1919 moved to Portland, Oregon. They were close friends to J. Allison, who took over Mott's from 1890 until it closed in 1920.

Both the factory and Mott's grand home of Hazelhurst are gone, but the images and artifacts of the once great business are still part of the collection here at the Dartmouth Heritage Museum.



## Staff News

I have been working on a fun Codex project at Dartmouth Heritage Museum (DHM). Our objective at DHM in using Codex, an online Dadavan system platform, is to make our collection accessible. We want to allow people around the world to be able to view and be inspired by Dartmouth and Halifax's rich history of Nova Scotia at any time right at the press of a button! Presenting engaging stories takes collaborative efforts from the team at Dartmouth Heritage Museum: staff, research volunteers, and the public. To provide the online audience with this exciting experience, every piece of content gathered needs to be properly organized, documented, and digitalized. Part of the digitalizing process is loading all the photos from our database and corresponding photo details into Codex. Details include photo descriptions, dimensions, photographer, tags (tags are used to facilitate online searching), and referencing. In our DHM database, we have the capability to narrow down the different types

of photos found in our collection. I have been able find five different types of photos: 1) Daguerrotypes (1839-1860) 2)Ambrotype (1854-1865) 3) Tintype (1856-1878) 4) Carte de Visite (1859-1889) 5) Cabinet Card (1866-1903). By identifying the different types of

# A View From Dartmouth - Prints for sale at Evergreen



A View from Dartmouth is a colourized etching by Susan Paterson based on the watercolour Halifax from Dartmouth (1855) by John William Hill (1812-1879). A View from Dartmouth depicts a view of the Halifax waterfront overlooking the Dartmouth commons and waterfront.

Susan Paterson recreated Hill's painting through a copper etching process. Using only a singular copper plate, she printed several copies. She then hand-painted all individual prints 'to order'. The museum currently has three of these uniquely hand-painted prints.

Sutton was a presser in the tailoring shop of A.E. McManus, which was located at the southeast corner of Hollis Street and Sackville Street.



## Talk - Much More Than Chocolate: Moirs Advertising and the Link to Identity

#### June I

Join us on June 1 from 2:00-3:00 pm for a sweet talk by Holly Hanes at Evergreen House titled "Much More Than Chocolate: Moirs Advertising and the Link to Identity".

This talk will explore (with lots of photographs), patterns and themes found within the Moirs advertisements. You may recognize the iconic rainbow gracing "Pot of Gold" box, which usually showcases a woman, but it is not the only Moirs' box that is influential to the company and



city's historic past. The company began in 1815, as a small kitchen bakery, and continued to operate in the greater Halifax area, in a factory style, until 2007. The forms of Moirs advertising have changed over time - from word of mouth, to print media and fancy delicate boxes, to commercials, and colonial symbols such as elephants and white tigers as an advertising gimmick.

She recently finished her Bachelor of Arts in History from Dalhousie and began her Masters in History this fall at Dalhousie, with focus on the Moirs Chocolate advertising. ## Main Level – Helen Creighton and the World of Folklore

Dr. Helen Creighton moved in to Evergreen House with her family in 1921. In 1928, she began her career as a folklorist: collecting songs and stories from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. A new permanent exhibit focuses on her long and significant career. This exhibit features many artifacts and includes audio-visual rooms, encouraging visitors to listen to songs that Helen collected, and to view snippets of documentaries on her life and work.

## Upper Level – Explosion! Dartmouth's Ordeal of the 1917 Disaster

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Harbour Explosion, we present the exhibit, *Explosion! Dartmouth's Ordeal of the 1917 Disaster*. This exhibit explores and reflects upon the impact of the event on Dartmouth. It focuses on the cause of the Explosion and how Dartmouth residents worked together to rebuild their community. Come see the much talked about Frank Baker diary, oral histories from survivors, eyewitness accounts, and artifacts from affected homes and families.
