

A Glimpse Back in Time -Diaries in the Collection

One of the biggest projects that I have been working on as the Collections Manager here at the Dartmouth Heritage Museum is digitizing our extensive archival collection. This work has been assisted by hundreds of hours of transcription work done by dedicated volunteers. The work varies from letters, postcards, to old newspaper articles. The largest projects of all however are often the most personal items that can be found in the collection: personal diaries. In the museum's collection, there are over a dozen personal diaries, both from what at first glance may seem like unexpected sources: That of two local businessmen. The diaries span from the early teenage years of these men, when they were initially assisting their fathers with their work, to when they took over the businesses themselves. The diaries overlap in years, offering a unique opportunity to glance back at Dartmouth in the mid-1880s to 1890s from at least two perspectives. Commentary on the weather, sports, joys and tragedies are all mentioned between these pages. This article delves a little deeper into who these men were.

J. Edwin Sterns

James Edwin Sterns was the son of Luther Sterns, well-known businessman in Dartmouth. The Sterns family owned one of the earliest dry-goods stores in the town. The business began in 1849, with the original business being on the corner of what is now Alderney Drive and Portland Street. Luther Sterns was both the owner of the store and the postmaster of Dartmouth. By 1879, the family built a brick

building - one of the first in town - to continue business there. That building is now 73 Alderney Drive.



James Edwin Sterns was born January 21, 1859. The two earliest diaries of his that we have are from 1874 and 1875 - the years he was 15-years-old and 16-years-old, respectively. Within the diaries, Edwin generally notes the weather throughout the year, paying particular attention to storms, and whether the lakes or even the harbour freeze over. Dance lessons, sleigh rides and parties were noted as being attended by either himself or any of his siblings: William Henry, George Albert, and Kate Louisa. More dramatic happenings in Dartmouth and Halifax, such as cases of robbery or arson, were also recorded. He notes in 1875, on March 15th, that he was able to close the shop on his own for the first time, since his father and sister, Louisa, were out at an evening event.


He would later become an official partner of the family business in 1884. That same year, his father purchased the land that their first business originally stood at, on the corner of Alderney Drive and Portland Street, with plans to expand the additional business with an storefront. Unfortunately, he passed away in 1892, so it was up to Edwin to complete the task which was done in 1894. This colloquially was known as "Sterns Corner" for many years, and now is 81 Alderney Drive. The building was considered very modern, and the family extremely professional. J. Edwin Sterns continued with the business until he retired in November of 1922. He would later pass away September 22, 1941, at the age of 82.




Left (top): Collins' Ruby Diary, 1899. DHM 1981.021.003.

Edwin Sterns had a very particular style for diary keeping: Brief and to the point. The one subject he always wrote about in some manner was the weather, in certain diaries he had even attached articles regarding severe or unique weather patterns. He also frequently wrote about the activity of his business. He often wrote the monthly revenue and expenses, and while he was rather frugal overall, the highest spending was often reserved to purchase things for his wife, Carrie. The family often would go on picnics either on McNabs Island or one of the islands on Lake Banook. They had a daughter, Marion, and Edwin often wrote about her in his diaries. Either regarding her health or highlighting milestones such as her starting kindergarten. While often dry and precise in his writing, the diary showed a man who was thinking about his family just as much as he was his business.

Harry Reginald Walker

Harry Reginald Walker was born August 3, 1872 to Edmund Morris Walker and Emma Elizabeth (nee Glendenning) Walker. Their house was on the corner of Ochterloney and Prince Edward Street (now Edward Street) at 58 Ochterloney.

Edmund Walker was a grocer, and Reginald joined his father's business around 1890, until the business was sold in 1910.



Around 1912, Reginald was a tea and spice packer, still working and living on Ochterloney Street. By 1917, he was a wholesale merchant, remaining with tea before becoming a more general wholesaler. The business was at 52 Ochterloney Street, and he continued to live with his parents at 58 Ochterloney Street

By 1919/1920, he transitioned his career to become the manager of the Royal Theatre, and later the Classic Theatre. The Royal Theatre was originally the Reform Club Hall in Dartmouth, and it was known as a "picture show" theatre specifically. He would eventually have a chain of theatres across the Province. He ran a carnival, and operated a motor car carnival. Well into the 1920s he remained a bachelor and was a member of the MicMac Rowing Club.

As Reginald Walker was a younger man in comparison to Edwin Sterns during the years of overlap of the diaries, he was much more active in the community. He would often write about whether he would be skating on the lakes, or at the Dartmouth Rink. In the summer months, he would be rowing on the lakes, or taking care of chickens and rabbits and entering them into local fairs also held at the Dartmouth Rink since it was also the local Exhibit Hall. He was a teacher of a local Sunday School, and would take note of how many students were in his class each time. He also took note of any deaths in the community, often listing the cause of death if known, and when the funeral took place. He would also excitedly note whenever extended family came to visit, or whether his family would go on holiday trips themselves.

Having the diaries of these two men from Dartmouth's past is a unique snapshot to look at the community during the mid 19th century. All of these diaries have now been digitized, and can be viewed on the Dartmouth Heritage Museum's page on NovaMuse.

Upside Down Apple Cake

From the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association and the Department of Agriculture 1978 pamphlet, p. 8.



- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 & 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/4 cup sugar
- NOVA SCOTIA APPLES

Cream butter and sugar together, add well beaten egg. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt, and add alternately with milk to first mixture. Add vanilla. Peel, core, and slide apples. Spread thick coating of butter on bottom and sides of a baking pan. Place apples regularly on bottom, overlapping pieces slightly, sprinkle with mixture of cinnamon and sugar, repeat. Pour Cake mixture over top, spreading to cover all the apples. Bake in a moderate over 3/4 to 1 hour. When cooked, turn on hot platter. If a firm fleshed apple is used, the top will be covered with a transparent layer of apples. Serve at once with a hard sauce or whipped cream.

Good Reads from the Gift Shop


In the Wake of the Alderney - Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, 1750-2000, was but one part of an extensive output of activity in the year 2000 overseen by the HRM Millennium Committee (Chair, Jack Keith) and the Dartmouth 250th Anniversary Committee (Chair, Audrey Manzer). Effectively, it forms the third part of a trifecta of works concerned with Dartmouth's history, the earlier two being Mary Lawson's 1893 History of the Townships of Dartmouth, Preston and Lawrencetown and Dr. John P. Martin's subsequent The Story of Dartmouth in 1957.

The timeline adopted by Chapman begins at Part 1 with a nod to the Indigenous presence in the area prior to the 1749 arrival of English settlers at Chebucto (Halifax), and commences in earnest with arrival of the English transport Alderney and discharge of 353 souls to the opposite harbour shore in late-summer 1750. Chapman traces Dartmouth's development up to the year 2000 in ten subsequent Parts, by which time the City of Dartmouth, legislated out of existence four years earlier by a provincial government headed by a former Dartmouth mayor, no longer existed legally or politically. The book concludes with seven appendices, six of which focus on lists of various Dartmouth citizens notable for their role in the development of the community, and a seventh providing a useful chronology of significant events in Dartmouth's history.

By his own admission, Chapman's history focuses "more on the people and events of twentieth-

century Dartmouth" rather than on the eighteenthand nineteenth-centuries, periods he was willing to
cede to Mary Lawson and John Martin. Fair enough.
In the Wake of the Alderney has no pretensions to
being an exhaustively researched and attributed
historical treatise – rather, it is a comprehensive
general chronology of the people and events that
advanced, and sometimes hindered, community
development. It is neither a gripping nor easy read,
but does achieve Chapman's stated aim, which was
"to look back and and celebrate the men and
women who helped fashion the City of Lakes and
look to the future with the hopes and dreams of the
Alderney settlers and those who followed in [her]
wake."

Available in hard- and soft-cover format, with numerous black and white photographs and illustrations, almost twenty-five years after the fact Chapman's history of Dartmouth presents, in Audrey Manzer's prescient words, "as a suitable testament to the long line of extraordinary people who have made Dartmouth the fine city I am proud to call home." A must-have for Dartmouth enthusiasts and nerds, it is available from the Dartmouth Heritage Museum Evergreen House gift shop at a tax-free price of \$30.00 (hard-cover) and \$20.00 (soft-cover).



The Dartmouth Heritage Museum wishes to recognize that we exist and operate on Mi'kma'ki, as the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which the Mi'kmaq, Wəlastəkwiyik (Maliseet), and Passamaquoddy Peoples first signed with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wəlastəkwiyik (Maliseet) title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations. This relationship continues today. **We are all treaty people.**
